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TOTAL SOLAR ECLIPSE APRIL 8, 2024



The total solar eclipse, on April 8, 2024, is the last great opportunity for large segments of our country to experience a total solar eclipse until 2045. Rochester, NY, sits on the **center of the path of totality** and it's the place you and your family will want to be on **April 8, 2024 at 3:20pm**.

Timing

2:07 PM: Eclipse begins as Moon will begin to cover the Sun.

3:20 PM: Totality Begins. Duration depends on where you're in the path of totality.

4:33 PM: Eclipse ends for Rochester viewers.

CITIES THAT WILL EXPERIENCE THE TOTAL SOLAR ECLIPSE. Please take a look at the map here.



Please note that Rochester is almost on the center of the path of the eclipse.

During totality, it should get very dark and it is the only time you would be able to see the following features of the sun: the corona (corona is the outermost part of the Sun's atmosphere and is usually hidden by the bright light of the Sun's surface), the colorful lights in the chromosphere (the chromosphere is a thin layer of particles that lies between the Sun's visible surface and the corona), and solar prominences (solar prominences are large, bright features extending outward from the Sun's surface). You can see these with your eyes uncovered because the moon will be blocking out the most extreme source of light. During totality you should feel a temperature drop, about 12 degrees, and animals may begin to act like it is nighttime. (Note: Pictures of the corona, prominences, and chromosphere are shown on the last page of this newsletter)

REMEMBER: Eclipse glasses must be used for viewing to protect your eyes. Glasses may be removed only when the sun is totally covered, and only then.

The next total eclipse in Rochester will take place on October 26th, 2144!

KEN'S KORNER: *Thoughts about the total eclipse.*

Have you ever pondered how miraculous a total eclipse is? Maybe not, but due to my interest in science, astronomy and geology I certainly have. What amazes me about a total eclipse is that the moon and the sun both have the same diameter when the eclipse occurs. Our moon is one of the largest moons in our solar system and, although other planets have total eclipses, they are not as curious or as special as ours. According to Robert Naeye, Senior Editor of Astronomy Magazine, "The moon and the sun have virtually the same angular size in our sky because the sun is 400 times wider than the moon, but it's also about 400 times further away. This allows us to see spectacular solar coronal displays and prominences during total solar eclipses." It is also the reason the entire sun is covered by the moon during a total eclipse. But, cosmologically and spiritually speaking was this some kind of accidental astronomical coincidence or did a higher power aid in its design. Somehow this question fascinates me. What do you think?

The other thing that fascinates me about a full solar eclipse is that it is, at least to me, metaphorically speaking, an Easter symbol of Christ's death and resurrection. The beginning of the eclipse is like the arrest of Jesus. As it progresses and as the sun gets darker we can associate that with Christ's being condemned to death, to his scourging, to being crowned with thorns, and having to carry the cross to Golgotha. When eclipse totality occurs and the sun's light is gone, so was Jesus' light extinguished with his death on the cross. It was not until 3 days later that the life and glorious light of Jesus returned. Likewise, after 3 minutes the sun once again reappears and its bright light fills the sky and covers the earth. I just think this is a neat way to observe the eclipse spiritually and mystically. It's a wonder of nature that we can enjoy and learn from.



NOTES FROM YOUR PASTOR'S DESK

Over my years living in the United States, I have discovered that I enjoy watching college sports. Specifically, I enjoy watching college football and college basketball. One of the main reasons that I enjoy spending time watching these sports is because there is a drive and commitment in college sports that is unparalleled. For most of these student athletes, college sports are as far as their competitive sporting careers will go. Very few of them will make it to the professional leagues. However, it is the potential of professional glory that motivates these students to excel. There is just something different about college sports that make them exciting, at least to me (and the 100,000 other people who watch some of these sports live, not to mention the millions on television). It's an exciting thing to be part of, even if it's just sitting at home on my couch cheering on whoever I'm cheering for that day.

Perhaps the most exciting time of the year in college sports I March Madness. For the uninitiated, March Madness is a tournament amongst some of the best teams in the nation. Each team gets to play at least one game. If a team wins, they move on to the next round of games. If a team loses, they are done. It's exciting because teams are playing to continue in the tournament. Sometimes there are "upsets" where the lower ranked (aka less highly regarded) teams beat the better or more highly regarded teams. There is an excitement that draws me in and keeps me engaged.

I give this background because it brings me to my main point. This past Saturday and Sunday, while I recovered from my medical procedure, I watched a number of games. After each game the reporters meet with the coaches and normally one of the players (often the best or standout player of the winning team). Without exception, when the coaches are asked about the game, they say that

they are so proud of how the team played together as one unit. They were committed to the game plan and played well together. When asked about the game, the player who is interviewed speaks about their teammates and how they worked hard as a team. You see the common theme? Teamwork. Working together as one unit towards a goal.

I think in terms of church. It's my worldview. I can't help but think about how the focus on teamwork and working towards a goal is what makes a successful church what it is. Just as the college basketball teams are made up of different people with different backgrounds, different skills, different personalities, different abilities, and different futures, it is those people working towards a shared vision that makes teams successful. Churches are just as diverse, but when we work together towards a shared vision, that too can be what makes a church successful.

LABC is a unique church. We are very diverse in a wide range of ways. However, it is because of that shared vision of being a people sharing God's love to the world that makes us who and what we are. There are losses, there are pains, there are sorrows, there are failures, but just as a college basketball teams learn from their wins and losses, we too learn from the good and bad. We pick ourselves back up and move forward.

I look forward to seeing what God is doing with our "team" at LABC during this Easter season and the time after. How is God calling us together as a unit so that we might do things greater than we could do ourselves? And how can we continue to work as a team to make a difference in our community, sharing God's love and grace to a world so desperately in need.

News and Views from our Director of Next Generation Ministry

Every good and perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of the heavenly lights, who does not change like shifting shadows. James 1:17, NRSV

Every week in Sunday School, we do Prayers of the People, just as in “adult church.” We structure our prayer time a bit differently than the liturgy that appears in the worship service, though. In Sunday School give each student a pencil and a Post-It Note (or two) and we prompt the students with something like: “Write down the name of someone who needs to feel God’s love today” or “write down a place that needs God’s help right now” or “write down a word that describes God.” We have the students generate all the prayers, but we attempt to model for them the various modes of prayer: supplication, thanksgiving, intercession, confession, adoration.

A few weeks ago, we prompted our Sunday School students with this simple prayer: “Write down one or two things that you’re grateful to God for.” We got a variety of standard responses -- *friends at church. Family. My school.* We also a few non-standard responses like *the Philadelphia Eagles* (What is that child thinking? Doesn’t that kid know that we don’t pray for any team other than the Bills?!?) and *chicken tenders.*

Chicken tenders? Really?!? They seems so silly and inconsequential in the scheme of things, but James reminds us that “every good and perfect gift is from above” (James 1:17, NIV). Why shouldn’t we thank God for chicken tenders? There are lots of ways to nourish our bodies, but God has given us a mechanism for achieving nourishment that is breaded and crunchy, with a little salt and spice. God has created things that bring us joy, and we should be grateful for them.

As adults I think that we sometimes fall into the trap of only thanking God for “the big stuff” or “the important stuff.” Human nature being what it is, though, we won’t give thanks for “the big stuff” and “the important stuff” if we have not first conditioned ourselves to celebrate “every good and perfect thing.” God is the source of all the good you have and all the good you crave – including chicken tenders! (And sometimes even the Buffalo Bills.)

THE SECOND ANNUAL UNITY SUMMIT

I recently attended the 2nd annual Unity Summit which was held on March 19th, 2024 at the Memorial Art Gallery. The event was hosted by The Finger Lakes Hate & Bias Prevention Regional Council. Lt. Governor Antonio Delgado attended as a keynote speaker and his speech was to ensure that the people of New York would continue to create safe spaces for difficult conversations.

The summit was focused on the people of New York and the ways to prevent hate crimes as well as repair the broken relationships between law enforcement, the justice system and the communities.

Community, youth and response panelists presented effective speeches. Over all, the event was well organized but the attendance could have been higher.

A Restorative Justice overview was Presented by Dina Thompson; executive Director of the Erie County Restorative Coalition. Her practices are based on positive relationships as central to building community, accepting cultural differences and encouraging personal responsibilities for change that which should be changed. Also, Restorative Justice seeks to find ways to repair the harms already done in the communities. Within all the communities, we should put our energy toward supporting without expectation the healing needs to make things right even though it might be a lengthy process. It truly was a day full of learning; hearing about the brokenness in our society as well as encouragement to take actions to correct them.

Toward the end of the summit, attendees were giving an opportunity to share personal experiences and I was able to share my Asian hate experience that happened 3 months ago in downtown Rochester. There are many of us have faced similar experiences, but it's always good to know & feel that there are people who are willing to listen to each other's experiences with understanding.

If we can all take responsibilities on our own actions, community, country and society would be a much better place for everyone.

UPDATE FROM OUR FRIENDS AND MINISTRY PARTNERS OF CAMERON COMMUNITY MINISTRIES CRCs MISMANAGEMENT OF NCP FUNDING

Monroe County has released the findings from their audit review, which state that "It does appear that Ms. Paradiso had absolute control over the financial aspects of the Organization" with regards to the CRC. This establishes that Tina Paradiso is the sole party being considered at fault for the financial malfeasance at play, and that no other partner agencies of the NCP are being considered at fault for what has taken place.

Finally, the record reflects the truth. The only guilt NCP, and more specifically, Cameron, has in this debacle is that **WE EXCELLED IN REACHING OUR CONTRACT GOALS AND PROVIDED THE MUCH-NEEDED WORKFORCE DE-VELOPMENT AND STREET OUTREACH SERVICES TO OUR COMMUNITY MEMBERS AS WE SAID WE WOULD.** The annual report for NCP submitted to Monroe County attests to that. Another fact is that we haven't received any reimbursements of funding since September 2023.

Despite not receiving any reimbursements of funding, the generosity of individuals, churches, civic groups, corporations, and foundations have sustained us in the interim. The value of the uplifting emails, cards, prayers, and phone calls received daily have been a great source of inspiration for us. Thank you!

I would be remiss in my comments if I didn't mention and thank our partners in the NCP. Committed is an understatement. We are here for each other, meeting weekly, sometimes having emergency meetings to strategize, research financial options, offer a listening ear, yet still provide services, as best as we can, for vulnerable individuals who depend on us. We lost a few partners because of their lack of funding, but we're working to bring them back with us. Cameron is fortunate and honored to be a partner among a group of 12 organizations whose leaders are some of the most dedicated and tenacious leaders in Rochester. We are still standing. It didn't break us or our commitments we made.

However, we are still feeling the effects of the malfeasance. While the audit is complete, funding has not been restored nor has a new administrator been selected for the project. It could be June before we begin to receive funding again. Our workforce development programs need to continue. We are looking for bridge funding, financial donations, volunteers to assist with donor development, and any resource or referral information to help us financially. We send heartfelt thanks to everyone who has and continues to support us. Your support keeps our spirits lifted and our motivation is high. We rest on our faith and know that "this too shall pass".






WHAT YOU CAN OBSERVE DURING THE TOTAL ECLIPSE OF THE SUN ON APRIL 8TH.
