Over the course of my time at LABC (13+ years), we have done a lot of different adult education classes, both on Sunday morning and throughout the week. We've done Bible studies, and sermon talk-back sessions. We've read books together and discussed a wide range of topics. In my estimation, while these various

approaches have offered unique opportunities for learning, they have not been as successful (or at least as well attended) as one specific approach.

Throughout the past few years, Tom Argust has interviewed a number of folks from our LABC family. This started out as part of our "getting to know people better" initiative (remember that "What's Next?" study we did a few years back – the end result was that people wanted to get to know one another more deeply, and so this adult education approach was an outcome of that work – and people's interest overall). However, over recent years, it has morphed into a variety of interviews that have helped us learn more about each other. Typically, Tom meets with the folks he is interviewing, gets to hear a bit of their story, and helps to develop a sense of what questions to ask to help move the conversation forward. Now, if you know anything about LABC, our Sunday morning adult education group has no trouble guiding (or throwing off) a conversation. We never run out of things to ask and talk about.

Most recently, Tom has interviewed a few of our church members who went to seminary and did typical training to become a pastor but ended up serving in less typical settings. For instance, he interviewed Rev. Dr. Jackie Sullivan who spent her career in chaplaincy in long term care and prison ministry. He interviewed Rev. Garth Brokaw who spent his career in ministry with the aged both in chaplaincy and then executive administration. Last week he interviewed me as I prepare to make a transition from pastoral ministry in a church to the not-for-profit sector.







The reason these interviews, all of them, have been so wonderful is because it's a chance to share our stories. We each have a story to tell, and so often all we need is someone who is willing to listen, ask some questions, and take the time to hear what we have to say. One of the things that I would suggest we are at risk of losing is the opportunity to share our stories, and to hear the stories of others. As we shorten our communications into emails and tweets, and seldom take the time to sit down face to face, we run the risk of seeing the loss of our own stories and the stories of our family/community/church.

I want to encourage you to reflect on your own story – what was your past like? How was your childhood? What did you do for education/work/play? What are your dreams for the future? Think about these things and more, and then I invite/encourage you to find ways to share some of those stories with others, and to invite others to share with you.

I recently performed a couple of memorial services, and both were full of stories of the deceased. I felt that I knew both of those folks better because I was invited to hear the stories of their lives. It is a privilege to be the recipient of someone's story, and to be entrusted to share it with others. Let's not wait until it is too late. Thank you to Tom for helping us recapture the importance of story, let us claim the story we each to share, and let us continue to find ways to share our stories, and hear each other's stories as we grow deeper in relationship with each other here at LABC.

The Ministry Must Go On

Dear LABC Family in Christ,

Michael

I write this letter with both sadness and hope. As many of you know, our long-time senior pastor, Rev. Dr. Michael Ford, has resigned from his position, and his last day will be November 23. I know this news comes as a shock to many. This is a huge loss for our congregation. Having served as senior pastor for over 13 years, Michael has become an integral part of our church family. Many of you have built deep bonds with him, and it's understandable that this transition feels difficult. I've heard several people ask, "What will we do without him?" or "What does our future look like?" I hope this letter can help address some of those questions and bring

reassurance during this time of change.

Michael is not only a gifted preacher but also a wise leader, a caring shepherd, and an all-around problem-solver. He has faithfully carried out many duties that go far beyond his official role. He never hesitates to help when asked, and his flexibility, dedication, and compassion are beyond words. Honestly, I sometimes think he spoiled us a little—in the best way possible (especially with all those cookies!). We deeply appreciate his ministry among us and will dearly miss his presence. I have struggled to find words to express how sad and even a bit lost I've felt since hearing of his resignation. I'm sure many of you share those feelings. Words cannot capture how much we appreciate his time, dedication, and love for LABC. He has helped shape us into who we are today.

And yet, the ministry must go on. We must continue our mission as a church. This doesn't mean we will easily move on or forget Michael—far from it. In Acts 20:36–38, we read that the Ephesian elders wept as they said goodbye to Paul, embracing him and accompanying him to the ship, knowing they would never see his face again. Like them, it's okay for us to feel sadness and to weep. But as the saying goes, the show must go on. By moving forward, we honor both Michael's decision and God's plans for his future. And we trust, as Jeremiah 29:11 reminds us, that God also has a plan for our future as a congregation.

Now, let's talk about what comes next. The church council met with Sandy Hasenauer, Executive Director of the American Baptist Churches of the Rochester/Genesee Region, on Monday, October 27, via Zoom. Together, we agreed that LABC should move forward with calling an interim pastor. Not because our church is struggling (thankfully, there's no drama, praise God for that!), but because this will give us time to discern our direction as a church while we begin the search for a permanent pastor.

Once we identify a strong candidate for interim pastor, we will present them to the congregation for a vote in accordance with our bylaws. This period will also allow us to form a search committee and complete the necessary steps to find our next senior pastor. While I can't share any names yet, we're still working on details like the job description and compensation package.

I'm happy to say that LABC has an excellent reputation. Word has already spread, and several pastors have expressed interest in serving with us!

I also want to reassure you that our church remains strong, both financially and in membership. Sandy will continue to guide and support us during this transition, and we're deeply grateful for her partnership.

In the meantime, the council has made plans for December and even January if needed, while we search for an interim pastor. Susan has kindly volunteered to coordinate worship during Advent and Christmas. She may reach out to some of you for help (and let's be honest—this church is full of retired ministers! I've never seen so many in one place, and yet we all get along. Woohoo!). So please continue to trust in God, be patient with me, and support the council as we navigate this transition together.

Okay, I'll end this letter here before it turns into an essay assignment (just joking!). Please don't hesitate to reach out to me with any questions or if you just want to talk—I'm always happy to chat.

P.S. We will, of course, celebrate Michael's farewell—because how could we possibly let him go without a party? Please contact me if you'd like to help or have questions about the event.

A Devotional by Aye Wathy Myat

Isaiah 6:8 reminds us of a time when Isaiah accepted God's call without hesitation. He heard God's voice asking, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" Isaiah responded, "Here am I;send me."

I remember telling myself that I would start a Master of Divinity program later in life—after I had my life together, everything figured out, and was fully situated and under my control. I took two gap years after completing my undergraduate program. Towards the end of my second year, I heard God's voice asking me, "Why not start now?" I thought about this calling, made up my mind, and said, "Here am I; send me." Use me as you will so that I can further God's kingdom. This is what Missonfest is all about: accepting God's calling and furthering His work to the ends of the earth.

As a seminarian, one of the most important things I have learned is how to be a good Christian. Mark 12:31 summarizes this when Jesus says, "Love your neighbor as yourself." Neighbor here doesn't just mean the people who are physically near you or the people you know. It also includes immigrants, refugees, foreigners, and strangers. To be a good neighbor means welcoming those who look, speak, or think different than us—with compassion. We are called to care for vulnerable communities and live out the love of Jesus Christ. The mission we are called to is to be a good neighbor by living out God's love in our homes, churches, communities, schools, or workplaces. I want to remind followers of Jesus that every small act of love we do contributes to God's bigger mission.

As we celebrate Missionfest this month, let us answer God's call and serve Him like Isaiah. Let Jesus' light shine through us so that our neighbors may see that very light within us.


